Read the following in-flight safety instructions from an airline company.

Air Europe In-flight Safety Card

Air Europe welcomes passengers on board today's flight. Please spend a few minutes reading through our in-flight safety instructions.

 Mobile telephones and other electronic equipment must be switched off during the flight, as these items may cause problems with the navigation and communication equipment on this aircraft.



- Smoking is not permitted in any part of the aircraft, including the toilets. If passengers smoke in the toilet, an alarm will sound.
- Passengers must fasten seat belts during take off and landing. We suggest that you keep your seat belt fastened throughout the flight, as we may experience turbulence.
- If there is turbulence, the 'Seat Belt' sign will light up. In the event of turbulence, you must fasten your seat belt.
- All bags and personal items must be stowed in the overhead locker or under your seat.
- Oxygen and the air pressure are always being checked. If air pressure drops, an oxygen mask will automatically drop from a compartment above your seat. If you are travelling with a child or someone who requires assistance, secure your mask first, and then assist the other person.
- Life jackets are under your seat. When you pull the tag, the jacket inflates.
- If you need assistance, call a flight attendant.

Air travel damaging global environment

In an exclusive interview with Environment Watch magazine, Mark Ellingham, author of the Rough Guide travel book series, talks about the disastrous effect rising demand for air travel is having on the environment.

Most of us have travelled by plane at some point in our lives, whether on a business trip or holiday with family and friends. However, as we hand in our boarding passes and take our seats on the plane, do we ever think of the environmental damage we are causing to the world?



Rising demand for air travel is one of the most serious environmental dangers facing the world today, says British travel writer, Mark Ellingham. In his latest book, *The Rough Guide to Climate Change*, Ellingham reports that the travel industry must start taking responsibility for the effect that carbon emissions from flying are having on climate change. If the growth in air travel continues at its present rate, it will contribute to higher global temperatures. This will mean very changeable weather and rising sea levels.

Ellingham believes that we can all do more to tackle the problem of climate change by limiting our own air travel, "We now live in a society where, if people have nothing to do at the weekend, they go to Paris or Rome for 48 hours. We fly anywhere whenever we want, 10 times or more a year. This has to change."

In many ways the travel boom has yet to start. In the years ahead many more millions will have the money and free time to fly further and more often. The Chinese and the Indians, for example, are starting to travel a lot as average incomes continue to rise.

To limit the growth in demand for air travel, Ellingham believes that airlines must start paying fuel tax, so that flying would become much more expensive. He also recommends that the European Union introduces an environment tax, a \$200 "green tax" on all flights to Europe and Africa and \$500 to more remote destinations.

Unfortunately, at present, there is little agreement amongst world leaders on how to tackle climate change. World tourism in the meantime continues to expand. Ellingham believes that the only way that most people will think about limiting air travel is by airlines increasing the cost of flying dramatically.




